

“The following descriptions clarify woman’s helper, life-giving ministry. The *ezer* words are strong, compassionate, relational, life-giving words:

<b>Helper / Life-giver</b>	<b>Hinderer / Life-taker</b>
Exodus 18:4 defends	attacks
Psalms 10:14 sees, cares for oppressed	indifferent, unconcerned for oppressed
Psalms 20:2 supports	weakens
Psalms 33:20 shields, protects	leaves unprotected and defenceless
Psalms 70:5 delivers from distress	causes distress
Psalms 72:12-14 rescues poor, weak, needy	ignores poor, weak, needy
Psalms 86:17 comforts	avoids, causes discomfort

## Being male, being female: part 3

### 1. Men, women and marriage

#### **(a) Marriage: unique union of one man & one woman**

- marked by love (of Christ, spouse, children and others)
- and service (of Christ, spouse, children and others)

#### **(b) Ordered union: head and helper**

- 1 Corinthians 11:3, Genesis 2:8
- Ephesians 5:22-33, 1 Peter 3:1-7
- Scripture examples: like Abraham and Sarah, Prisca and Aquila, Prov. 31

### (c) The challenge of headship and submission

- an expression of love
- a challenge because of sin
- “my calling as a Christian husband is...
  - does not demand to be served (and get his own way), but serves and sacrifices for the good of others, and the glory of Christ
  - does not have to initiate every action, but does feel the responsibility to provide a general pattern of initiative
  - is patient and wise, approaching situations with graciousness and tact, seeking counsel and listening wisely and well.
  - accepts the burden of the final say in disagreements, but doesn't presume to use it in every instance
  - Is marked by repentance and humility. We need God's forgiveness through Christ (the perfect and second Adam), and the power and wisdom of His Word.
  - Fight common sins for men/husbands, that harm our relationships:
    - abdicating responsibility – Genesis 3:6
    - anger and abuse – Genesis 3:16, 1 Timothy 2:8, 1 Peter 3:7
- “my calling as a Christian wife is...
  - is willing to obey authority whenever it is wise and right to do so
  - has the best interests of others in mind
  - is patient and wise, approaching situations with graciousness and tact
  - has the courage to stand for what is right
  - is willing to share observations, knowledge and insight
  - is willing to accept the final decision of a well-meaning head, even if it is not your desired outcome
  - has faith that God has a purpose for every circumstance and works as part of the process, trusting God for the outcome
  - E.g. the wife of Proverbs chapter 31
  - Fight common sins for women/wives that harm our relationships:
    - Discontent with God's order: Genesis 3:16, “... Your desire will be for your husband, and he will rule over you...”
